Our action plan for the 2023-2024 year has been defined around three main pillars:


Axis 1 - A downtown on a human scale

A CONSOLIDATED VISUAL IDENTITY





Over the past year, the Peter-McGill Community Table has focused on strengthening its brand identity. This strategic approach aimed to enhance our presence within the community and better communicate our values and objectives. By concentrating on our brand image, we hope to increase the recognition of our organization and deepen our connection with neighborhood residents.

New colors were also chosen to better reflect the identity and values of the Table. Through this new online space, we aim to provide a dynamic and accessible platform for all Peter-McGill residents, further amplifying our impact in the community.

The work is far from finished, as we continue our efforts with the development of a new website currently under construction. This modern and intuitive site will be a key tool for sharing our initiatives, news, and events, while making it easier for the community to engage and participate.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

2023-2024

REPRESENTATIONS

Once again this year, the leadership of the Peter-McGill Neighborhood Table supported the work of the Montreal Coalition of Neighborhood Tables (CMTQ) as president by actively participating (in 10 meetings) in the work of its board of directors and in representation efforts with current funders. These efforts led to the addition of \$25,000 annually and recurrently to each of the City's Neighborhood Tables, including Peter-McGill.


At the same time, about fifteen meetings were held with City representatives (elected officials, civil servants), around ten of which were dedicated to discussions about the future Sanaaq Center, which is expected to open in the spring of 2025 and will host the new offices of the Neighborhood Table. The center is intended to be a cultural and community hub to meet the social facility needs of the Peter-McGill residents.

The Table also actively participated in discussions about the future of the YMCA through representation meetings and involvement in the YMCA's advisory sales committee. Letters were sent to four different ministers, and two meetings were held with the offices of the Ministers of the Metropolis and Sports/Recreation. Meetings were also held with the Mayor of Montreal, the head of urban planning, the Mayor's chief of staff, the city councilor, the provincial member of parliament, and the president of the YMCAs of Quebec to advocate for keeping the building for community purposes. An intervention was also made at the Borough Council.

Representation meetings, an open letter to the media, and an intervention at the Borough Council were also made to advocate for the creation of a reflection committee on the issue of the unelected Borough Mayor in Ville-Marie. This request was rejected by the Borough.

Lastly, meetings took place between the three neighborhood tables of the Borough and its leadership, leading to a one-time \$25,000 funding from the Ville-Marie Borough.

OUR ACTION FIELDS



COMMUNITY HOUSE

This year was marked by the launch of the Community House, envisioned as a social laboratory aimed at providing families, seniors, and the general public with an accessible and free gathering and networking space in their neighborhood. Designed and adapted for everyone (with games, toys, tables, etc.), it also offers young adults access to a suitable coworking space and potential support (e.g., CJE).

Through this project, we aim to demonstrate the importance of sharing, socialization, and community spaces in the neighborhood, as well as to develop and promote citizen involvement and mobilization in organizing the community center (volunteering, activities, committees, etc.).


NEIGHBORHOOD PORTRAIT

After an initial version of the Peter-McGill neighborhood profile in 2020, we decided to update it this year with the new demographic data we have. This work was carried out in collaboration with the firm **Rayside Labossière**, which we would like to thank.

The purpose of this profile is to accurately illustrate all the characteristics of this area of the city and to clearly understand the ongoing issues, such as the lack of green and community spaces, as well as disparities in living conditions (housing value, income, unemployment, etc.).

POPULATION GROWTH The population of Peter-McGill has been steadily increasing since 1986. The demographic growth was significant between 2016 and 2021, with 9,448 new residents during this period. This represents a major growth of 26.4%, compared to the increase observed between 2011 and 2016, which was only 6.2%. 26 136 29 935 35 789 45 237 Population Growth in Peter-McGill from 2016 to 2021


LANGUAGES In Peter-McGill, 16,410 residents speak only English, accounting for 36.3% of the population. This proportion is higher than in Montreal (27.2%) and Ville-Marie (13.7%). Additionally, it has increased since 2016, when the figure was 33.6% in Peter-McGill. The majority (52.2%) of residents in Peter-McGill have a non-official language as their mother tongue, totaling 21,280 individuals. 
INCOMES

NEARLY ONE IN THREE PEOPLE LIVE BELOW THE LOW-INCOME THRESHOLD

While Ville-Marie is the Montreal borough with the highest frequency of low income, Peter-McGill has an even higher rate than the borough itself. In comparison, 11.6% of the Montreal population is in the same situation. This rate has slightly decreased since 2016, when it was at 33.3% (Statistics Canada, 2016). The strong presence of students in the area may partially contribute to this trend.

URBAN PLANIFICATION

The Collective Impact Project (PIC) of the Peter-McGill Neighborhood Table focuses on urban planning issues and challenges, particularly the lack of green and public spaces and the needs for social housing.

Let's move in Peter-McGill

iLet's move in Peter-McGill is a project developed by the Neighborhood Table in collaboration with several of its partners: Innovation Jeunes, Le Monastère, CJE Centre-Ville, and Action Réfugiés Montréal. A series of cultural and sports events were organized during the summer of 2024 to make the most of the neighborhood's outdoor and community spaces. These events included activities such as olympiads, jam sessions, art workshops, circus performances, and more.




Green spaces

FOOD SECURITY

The food security committee was established to support groups in implementing food security initiatives. The committee aims to reduce financial, social, and physical barriers to adequate nutrition by developing collective and sustainable projects.





Launch of the Kitchen Corners program

- This year, in May, we officially launched the Kitchen Corners program with the help of a supervisory subcommittee made up of five partners and the community center.
- We inaugurated the Kitchen Corners by creating a community web page, promoting community cooking activities with innovation support and setting up a FREE kitchen equipment loan system at the Community House.
 - ▶ 22 subscribers to the equipment library.



The total funding for the Kitchen Corners program amounts to \$65,000 per year for four years, with the possibility of applying for an additional \$15,000 per year for the last two years of the program in November.

COHABITATION

The Cohabitation mandate aims to foster better understanding and inclusion between vulnerable and marginalized individuals in the neighborhood and residents, students, merchants, and other groups. It seeks to reduce inequalities and harmonize the availability, access, and use of resources and community spaces for all demographic groups through collaborative activities with multiple stakeholders addressing health, safety, and the overall well-being of the neighborhood.



- The main project of the cohabitation mandate is the **Neighborhood Wellness Brigades**, with Résilience, Chez Doris, Sollicite (formerly SAESEM) and the Hadley Community since this year.
- First homeless services meeting on June 17.

SENIORS

The seniors' committee aims to break the isolation among seniors and reduce barriers to accessing resources (related to mobility as well as access to information - e.g., digital divide).

The seniors' committee brings together representatives from various organizations to improve the quality of life for seniors in the neighborhood. It identifies their needs, coordinates activities, and develops annual guidelines. The committee also promotes social inclusion and active aging while ensuring follow-up on initiatives that benefit seniors.


YOUTH ACTION

The Éclaireurs network has also been established, a mental health project initiated by the Ministry of Health and Social Services, aimed at increasing the adaptability and resilience of individuals and communities during and after a pandemic.

This mental health promotion initiative aims to identify and support individuals with fragile psychological states while facilitating access to resources and services. The "Éclaireurs" are key individuals or professionals already present in their community, trained in psychological first aid.

IMMIGRATION

The Immigration Committee brings together various stakeholders (organizations, public services, associations) to improve the integration of immigrants. Its goal is to identify their needs, coordinate services, and develop actions that promote their social and economic inclusion. The committee also monitors initiatives and encourages collaboration among stakeholders to facilitate the reception and integration of immigrants.

FAMILIES

The downtown family committee brings together family partners in the neighborhood to address the issues and needs of families through collective and coordinated projects. The aim is to make the neighborhood as suitable as possible for families, offering a diverse range of services that align with their expectations and profiles.





Funding was received this year from the DRSP to enable the distribution of baskets containing essentials for babies as well as food products to families in the neighborhood.

In **December 2023**, the **Christmas Potluck** took place, bringing together about thirty people.




